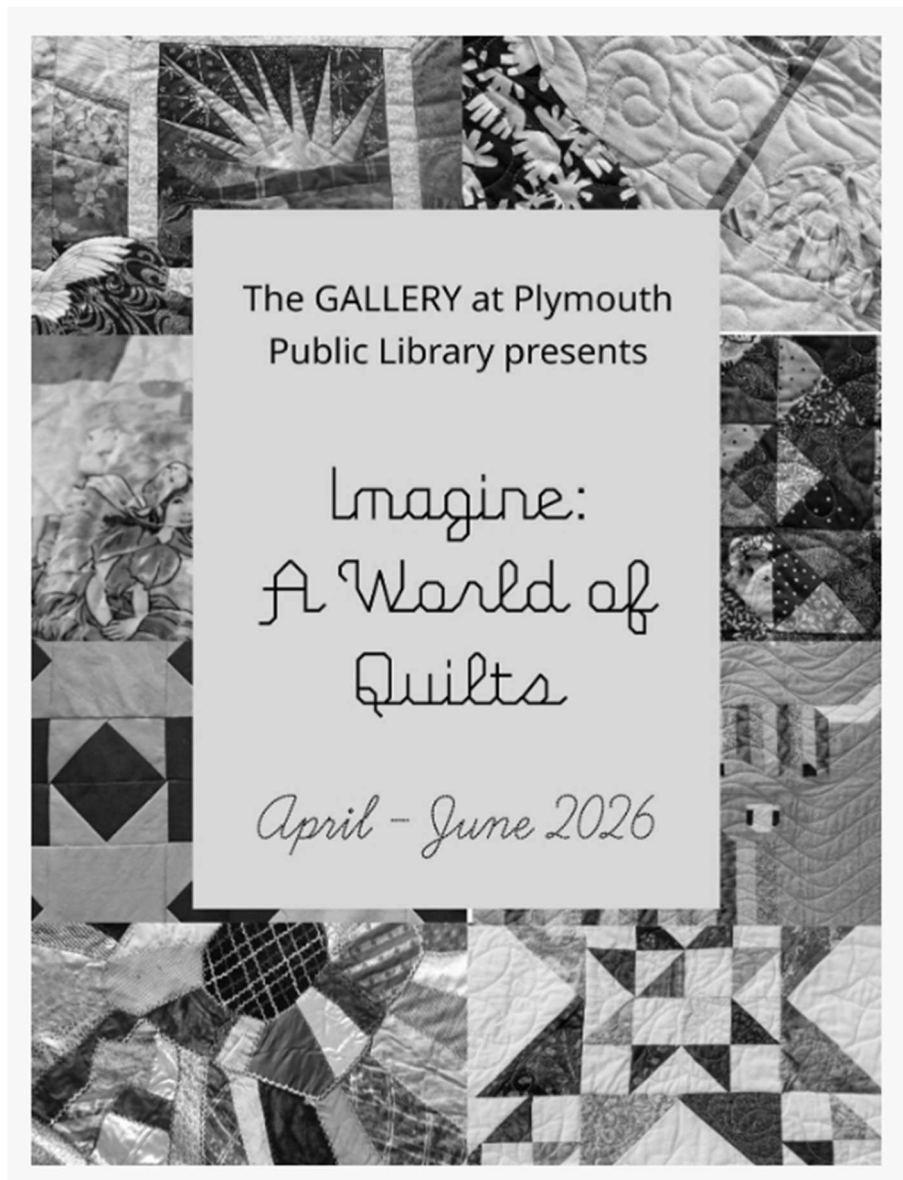

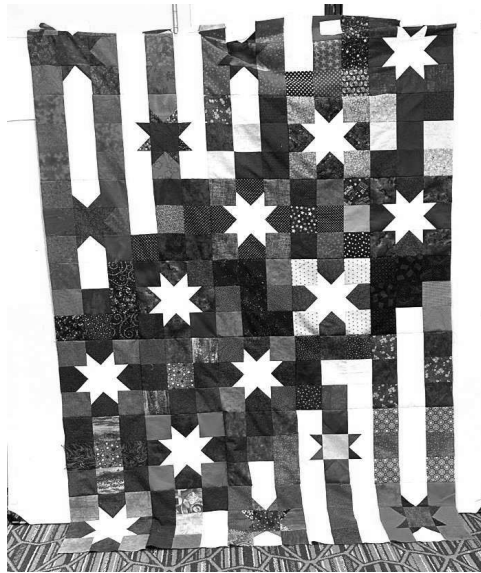

THE 2026 PEGGY BEALS QUILT BLOCK CONTEST

"America the Beautiful: Scenic America "

The 2026 theme will be **"America the Beautiful: Scenic America"**.

A quilt containing 20 winning blocks will be hand quilted by volunteers during the 2026 Marshfield Fair. The finished quilt will be raffled off in the year 2027. All entrants' names are included in the raffle.

Theme: America the Beautiful: Scenic America

Sashing: TBD

Method: Using 100% cotton, make a traditional pieced pattern, applique, or an original design.

DO NOT back the block.

Size: Block should be 12 1/2" unfinished.

Prizes: 1st - \$50, 19 runners-up - \$15

Quilt pin for the 25th block entered.

Also: A viewers' Choice Award will be given.

Mail Entries to: PBQBC, Marshfield Fair, Box 5, Marshfield, MA 02050

Deadline: June 1, 2026

Marshfield Fair cannot be responsible for the blocks, but we've never lost one yet.

To Submit:

1. **Attach entry form to back of each block with safety pin. You may submit any number of blocks - only one can win.**
2. Photograph your block before you send it!
3. Winners and next year's information will be emailed to all participants after the fair.
4. For judges comments, check the box on the entry form and an email will be sent after the fair.
5. For return of non donated block, enclose self-addressed 6x9 envelope with adequate postage attached.
6. Blocks donated, unspecified or without return envelope as described above are made into quilts for charities.
7. The Junior competition is for youth ages 5-18. All the above rules and entry dates apply.

Marshfield Fair/Peggy Beals Quilt Block Contest

Tips, Comments and Tricks

Be creative with your entry!

As you create your block and before you send your block make sure:

You used 100% cotton to create your block.

You remove any visible pencil lines outlining to 12" frame or applique positions.

You use applique stitches around any motif that has been ironed on.

You have not used multiple layers of fusible product – remember, the quilt blocks will be hand-quilted, and the needle must get through all thicknesses.

You check for holes where your thread may have slipped away from the seam.

You cut away the selvage edge.

You can see your design halfway across the room. If you use too many similar colors or fabrics, your design becomes a blur. Create contrast!

You created a block following the theme.

Your block measures exactly 12 1/2". Are your seams accurate? If your pieced seams are not accurate, your block may be too small. If you applique or embroider/RedWork, be sure to cut a generous sized background.

You get your block entered in time! Quilt block entries must be **postmarked by JUNE 1**.

Other notes:

Quilt blocks travel well in a baggie slipped into a plain manila envelope.

Donated blocks are made into comfort quilts and donated to local charities.

Non-donated blocks with postage paid envelopes are sent out after the fair in September.

Photos of the completed "America the Beautiful" quilt will be mailed to the winners.

On a kinder, gentler note, the Country Arts Committee of the Marshfield fair is so grateful to those of you who enter. Without you, there would be no quilt and no display of blocks which so impress the visitors to the fair. Please don't let any of the above frighten you. You can't win if you don't enter, and many winners have never before entered. Send in more than one block; the last-minute "throw away" often captivates the judges.

BLOCK OF THE MONTH

The BOM for MAY is the "Dorothy's Star" block from Marcia Hohn. We are asked to use BRIGHT COLOR fabrics for this block! For Each block you bring to the May Meeting, you'll receive a raffle ticket and the winner goes home with a stack of blocks!

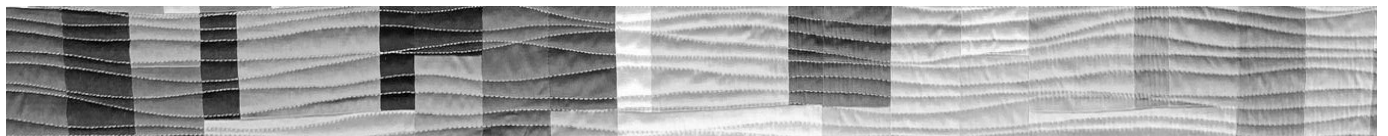


COMFORT QUILTS

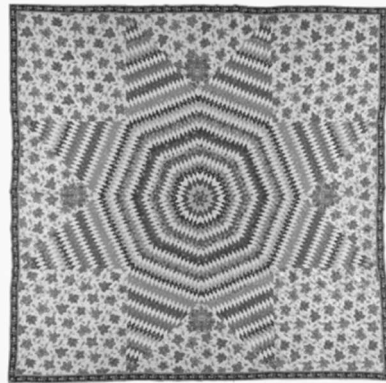

7. Flowers by Fat Quarter Shop

Fat Quarter Flowers Quilt

Use 1/4" seams and press as arrows indicate throughout.

BLOCK ASSEMBLY

With right sides facing, layer a Fabric A rectangle with a Fabric B rectangle.

Place a one by two section of 7" Triangles on a roll on top and pin in place.

Set stitch length to 1.5 and sew on the dotted lines.

Cut apart on the solid lines.

Half Square Triangle Unit should measure 7 1/2" x 7 1/2".

Make eighty.

Cut each Half Square Triangle Unit in half vertically.

Print Rectangle Unit and Background Rectangle Unit should measure 3 1/4" x 7 1/2".

Make eighty Print Rectangle Units.

Make eighty Background Rectangle Units.

Assemble one Background Rectangle Unit and one different Print Rectangle Unit.

Partial Petal Unit should measure 7" x 7 1/2".

Make eighty.

Fabric Requirements

Ten Fat Quarters or 18" x 20" rectangles
2 1/2 yards background fabric
1/2 yard binding fabric
3 1/2 yards backing fabric
2 rolls 7" Half Square Triangle Paper - Triangles on a Roll #H700

Cutting

Cut each 18" x 20" rectangle into:
2 - 8 1/2" x 16 1/2" rectangles - 20 total (Fabric A)

Cut background fabric into:
20 - 8 1/2" x 16 1/2" rectangles (Fabric B)

Cut binding fabric into:
7 - 2 1/2" x width of fabric strips (Fabric C)

Cut 7" Half Square Triangle Paper into:
20 - one by two sections (2 squares each)

Challenge Quilts

Every other year, to coincide with our bi-annual quilt show, HRQG offers a challenge to our quilters. A theme is provided, along with a specific size, then members unleash their creativity! Challenge quilts are presented at the September 2026 monthly Guild meeting, where 100+ members of the guild judge them. Next, they travel to the bi-annual quilt show, where they are shared with the public!

The theme for our 2026 challenge is **“Making a Grand Entrance”**. Your design can be anything that is your interpretation of the theme. Use your imagination and have fun. We encourage everyone in the guild to participate in this challenge.

QUILTS ENTERED IN THE CHALLENGE WILL BE DISPLAYED AT OUR SEPTEMBER 2026 QUILT SHOW!

- **#1 RULE: HAVE FUN!** Use your imagination! Your creation can be traditional or contemporary.
- **REQUIRED!** Your challenge must be in the shape of a rectangle measuring 20" by 24 inches. Your challenge must be a “quilt”... 3 layers including front, back and batting and quilted. Your rectangle can be either vertical or horizontal. Make sure any embellishments you add won't droop when we hang your challenges. Also make sure your sleeve is on the correct edge on the back so we know which end is up for hanging.
- **Methods of Construction:** You are free to use whatever construction, or quilting methods work best for your creation (i.e., machine pieced, hand pieced, paper pieced, machine appliqued, hand appliqued, machine or hand quilted, etc.). We encourage you to challenge yourself and be creative.
- **Fabric Requirement:** You can use whatever fabrics you want in your challenge. Your fabrics do not all have to be 100% cotton. Embellishments are optional.
- **Hanging Sleeve and Label:** The quilt back must have a hanging sleeve. Make sure you put a label with your name on the back of your challenge. Give credit to the source that inspired you. ***Please cover up your label with a piece of paper, fabric or tape before handing it in for voting at our guild meeting so it's a secret as to who made it.***
- **Due Date:** Finished challenges are due at our September 2026 guild meeting for judging by your quilt guild peers and subsequently will be hung at our September 2026 quilt show for attendees to vote on their favorite. All guild members attending the September 2026 meeting will have the opportunity to vote anonymously for their favorite challenge quilt. Ribbons will be awarded for guild favorites, and the top favorites of show viewers. If you have any questions about the challenge, please contact Mary Ann Karpinski.

Sadly, neither place exists there anymore.

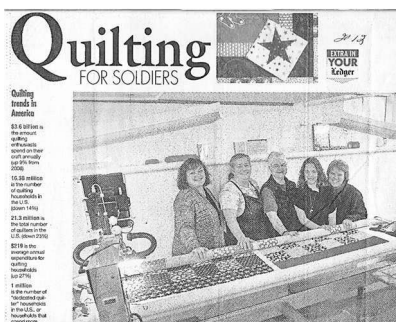

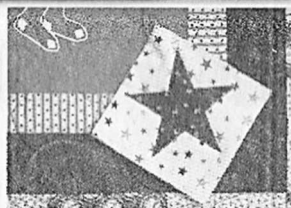

Local women's craft helps military families to stay connected

A deep-rooted love for the Boston Red Sox helps keep Anne Marcin and her mother connected despite living more than 3,400 miles apart.

Marcin was born in France and now lives in Scituate. Her mother was born in Scituate and now lives in France.

"When I was growing up in France, my mother's two favorite topics were horses and the Red Sox," Marcin, 52, said. "My sister was bored with those two, but I loved them both."

Marcin's passion for the Sox was the basis of her most recent charitable endeavor. Along with several other local women, Marcin helped create 100 sports-themed

quilts for military families.

Two weeks ago, Marcin delivered 70 of those quilts to the non-profit organization Wrapped Up in Sports, which then delivered the blankets to families living on the Hanscom Air Force Base.

The 36-by-48-inch quilts featured mostly Red Sox logos and the ballplayer's names, which were cut off the fronts and backs of T-shirts. There were also some Patriots, Celtics, Bruins and New England Revolution-themed quilts.

Each quilt was accompanied by 6-inch quilted squares containing patriotic stars. The stars were for the servicemen and women to hold onto, while the sports quilts were given to their children.

The quilt combos are designed to help parents and their kids feel more connected when the adults are deployed.

Marcin got the idea to make these keepsakes after she attended a "Quiltathon" at

Fenway Park last year. She said it's somewhat serendipitous that her Red Sox quilts serve to unite families, considering that the Sox have always helped bring her and her mother together.

Every summer, Eleanor Chevnard, 93, flies in from France to visit her daughter in Scituate, where she can watch the Sox games.

"She always plans to stay in Scituate until the World Series is over in October, just in case the Red Sox make it," Marcin said.

Marcin, a registered nurse, is one of five women who get together in Holbrook every weekend to make quilts for various charitable causes. The group consists of Marcin, Maureen Anderson, Jackie Leahy, Cyndi Meaney and Meaney's teenage daughter Rachel.

They have donated quilts to the Fisher House for military families in West Roxbury, the state's Department of Children

and Families, and the Conquer Cancer Coalition of Massachusetts.

"When you love to quilt, you make them and you make them, and there's only so many you can make for your family and friends," Cyndi Meaney, a Bridgewater resident, said. "So the best thing to do is donate them to charity."

Although the women set out to help other people in need, Marcin said her favorite hobby also benefits her own family. Her 13-year-old son recently had a cyst surgically removed from his back and has been bed-ridden with recurring ailments.

To ensure that her son doesn't get lonely during his recovery, Marcin set up a quilting station outside his room.

"I'm just there quilting away," Marcin said. "If he needs me, I'm right there."
